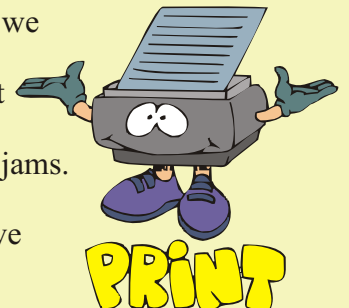
Run checkdisk

Backup Important Data

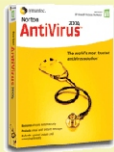
Run Windows & Office updates

## The Cause of Most Printer Failures

I know that most of us don't read the user manuals that come with the products we purchase. But if you don't read anything else, READ THE SECTION ON CLEARING PAPER JAMS for your printer. Simply yanking the paper out the front can permanently damage many printers, especially with ink jet printers. Most printers have a removable panel in the back specifically designed for clearing paper jams. Each printer has a specific method for clearing paper jams so check your manual or online for instructions for your exact model. A few minutes with the manual can save you hours of aggravation or maybe even the cost of a new printer.



## Do Not Upgrade Your Norton Antivirus Software Online



I receive a large number of service calls that are caused by problems with upgrading Norton Antivirus or Internet Security Software online. Even if you feel compelled to stick with Norton, please save yourself a lot of grief and aggravation by purchasing a full retail version that comes with an installation CD. This will allow you to reinstall when you run into problems.. **Remember to uninstall your current version before installing the new one.** Due to so many problems this year, I personally would stay clear of all Norton Software at this point. It is up to you, but there is really no reason that you should be paying at all for Antivirus or security software. Most all internet providers such as Comcast, Verizon and AOL offer these products for free to their subscribers or there are many Free Versions available for download.

## Should you Upgrade to Internet Explorer 7?



Microsoft's New Internet Explorer 7 has been out of Beta test for only a few weeks and is now being offered to you through Microsoft's automatic updates. If you receive a notice to install Internet Explorer 7, you may want to think twice. Some programs and plug-ins have not been updated yet to work properly with IE 7. If you connect to your companies custom online database or server, you may have trouble until the bugs have been worked out. Some online banking and financial systems may also have some initial problems. If you decide to try it and have problems, you can just uninstall it by going to START > CONTROL PANEL > ADD REMOVE PROGRAMS and remove Ie7, which will bring you back to your original version.

## Remote Service Will Be Down Nov 29 thru Dec 4th.

Those of you who rely on my remote connection service for repairs and training will experience a short interruption from Wednesday, November 29th until Monday, December 3rd. ## Call or Email Me Before You Buy Your Next Computer
